

Tony Ehrlich former CCC president asked me to share his tribute to Bob Wynn who recently stepped down from his role with the CCC.

To The Editor:

In the July CCC Newsletter, it was announced that Bob Wynn was stepping down as Club Co-Chair and as a member, although he says he will continue to assist with our shows and in preparing the ham for the Annual Holiday Party. I thought that some of our newer members may not know much about this extraordinary man, his photography, and his many contributions to the Club over the years, hence this letter.

Bob is (or was) one of our members with the most Club longevity. I first met him attending a board meeting in the 1990s. He greeted me with a warm smile and immediately offered good advice about my nascent photographic ambitions. I have gotten to know him well in the intervening years and we have become good friends.

Due to the ravages of age, the Club had only about fifteen members at that time and the number continued to shrink. In my innocent eagerness, I was nominated for and became Chairman (you guessed it--no one else would do it). Bob volunteered to be Treasurer, a post he filled for some years. Although our treasury was minuscule in those days, he guarded it carefully.

After some years, the burden of serving as Chair began to weigh on me. Rather than let me resign, however, Bob volunteered to be Co-Chair with me as well as continue as Treasurer. Of course, he was always involved in the registration and hanging of our shows, as well as making Club policy. When long-time member George Oliver announced that he could no longer prepare the ham for what we then called the Christmas Party, Bob took on that responsibility as well. When I was finally forced to resign

due to family health issues, he continued as Co-Chair with Ans. He was the Club's go-to man! Bob and Ans, some other former Club members, and I enrolled for several years in a rather wonderful Saturday photographic seminar at then-Daytona Beach Community College, mentored by Per Hans Romnes. Bob was always creative and imaginative as to how he took pictures, the equipment he fabricated to use, and the interesting images he produced.

One day he showed up with a huge, heavy lens, nearly fourteen inches in diameter, obtained as salvage from the NASA rocket program. His intent was to use a VW beetle as the camera body for that lens! That never happened, but he continued to innovate. He was the first one I knew to take pictures with a cell phone, years before they were easily available; I still have two of his images from those days on my wall.

He became interested in three-dimensional photography and devised a bracket on which he mounted two miniature cameras and found software to combine their images into three-D. I still have a few of those images and the special "glasses" he provided to view them. He came up with a home-made gopro camera long before there was such a thing, and later fashioned a ten-foot rod on which to mount a small camera to provide photographs with a perspective impossible to achieve otherwise. I've forgotten some of his other creations.

Not surprisingly, he often dressed unconventionally, but always with his special taste. It was many years until I saw him in tie and jacket, when he won Best In Show in one of our events, the last time I saw him so attired. A photo is included here to prove the point. Despite his sometimes unusual appearance, however, he continued to be a most reliable friend and photographer, kind of the godfather of the Casements Camera Club. He has earned the right now to devote more of his time to some of his many other interests.
